ART	TICLE 1: AGREEMENT
1.1	This is a bilateral and binding Agreement ("Agreement") by and between
	the Hemet Unified School District ("District") and the Hemet Teachers
	Association, CTA-NEA ("Association"), an employee organization. This
	Agreement is entered into pursuant to Sections 3540-3549 of the
	California Government Code.
1.2	This agreement shall be effective from July 1, 2019, through June 30,
	2022. Negotiations are closed for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school
	years. The parties agree to reopen up to two (2) articles each for the
	2021/2022 school year in addition to Articles 8 (Health and Welfare
	Benefits) and 9 (Salaries). Additionally, the parties agree to meet and
	discuss the content of MOU's that expire during the term of this
	Agreement. The Parties shall submit their initial proposals to each other
	for a successor agreement prior to the expiration of this Agreement.
1.3	The District and Association agree that it is to their mutual benefit and to
	the benefit of the educational program and the pupils of the District to
	encourage the resolution of differences through the meet and negotiation
	process. Therefore, it is hereby agreed that the parties will support this
	Agreement for its term.
1.4	Should the State Legislature broaden the scope of the Rodda Act by
	expanding the existing provisions of or adding new provisions to
	Government Code Section 3543.2, as to these new items, at any time that
	this contract is reopened such items may be the subject of negotiations upon
	demand of either party.
1.5	Negotiations as to the traditional calendar may be conducted separately
	from the remaining provisions of this Agreement, and shall be commenced
	no later than May 1, of each year of this Agreement. The parties shall

1 attempt to reach agreement by the end of the school year for the 2 traditional calendar. 3 1.6 The District will provide the Association with a final copy of the collective 4 bargaining agreement within 90 days of Governing Board approval. 5 ARTICLE 2: RECOGNITION 2.1Pursuant to the requirements of Government Code Section 3544.1, the 6 7 District recognizes the Association as the exclusive representative for the 8 unit described as follows: 9 "All full-time, part time, temporary and dependent charter school 10 certificated employees, in the Hemet Unified School District. Excluded 11 from this unit are all certificated employees designated by the District as 12 management, supervisory and confidential, pre-school teachers and all 13 substitutes who work in the Hemet Unified School District. 14 ARTICLE 3: ORGANIZATIONAL SECURITY 15 3.1 Any employee in the bargaining unit who is a member of the Association, or who has applied for membership, may sign and deliver to the 16 17 Association a written statement authorizing deduction of membership 18 dues, initiation fees, and general assessments of the Association, who 19 shall then provide the information to the District. Pursuant to such 20 authorization, the District shall deduct one-tenth (1/10) of such dues from 21 the regular salary check of a member each month for ten (10) months. 22 Deductions for members who sign such an authorization after the 23 commencement of the school year shall be appropriately prorated to complete payments by the end of the school year. The District shall not be 24 obligated to put into effect any new or changed deduction until the pay 25 period which commences thirty (30) days or more after such submission. 26

1	3.2	With re	espect to all sums deducted by the District, the District will remit
2		such m	onies to the Association accompanied by an alphabetical list of
3		employ	rees from whom such deductions have been made.
4	3.3	Dispute	es involving this Article shall be settled between the Association
5		and the	e employee and shall not be subject to the grievance procedure.
6	ART	ICLE 4:	DISTRICT RIGHTS
7	4.1	It is ag	reed that the District retains all of its powers of direction,
8		manag	ement and control provided by law. Included in these District
9		powers	provided by law and consistent with this Agreement are the
10		exclusi	ve rights to:
11		4.1.1	Determine its organization.
12		4.1.2	Direct the work of its employees.
13		4.1.3	Determine the hours of District operations.
14		4.1.4	Determine the kinds and levels of services to be provided, as well
15			as the methods and means of providing them.
16		4.1.5	Establish its educational policies, goals and objectives.
17		4.1.6	Insure the rights and educational opportunities of students.
18		4.1.7	Determine staffing patterns.
19		4.1.8	Determine the number and kinds of personnel required.
20		4.1.9	Maintain the efficiency of District operations.
21		4.1.10	Determine District curriculum.
22		4.1.11	Design, build, move or modify facilities.
23		4.1.12	Establish budget procedures and determine budgetary allocation.
24		4.1.13	Determine the methods of raising revenue.
25		4.1.14	Take reasonable action on any matter in the event of emergency.
26		4.1.15	Contract out work.

In addition, the Governing Board retains the right to hire, 1 2 classify, assign, evaluate, promote, demote, terminate, and discipline employees under provisions of the Education Code. 3 This recital in no way limits other District powers as granted by 4 5 law. 4.2 6 The exercise of the foregoing powers, rights, authority, duties and 7 responsibilities by the District, the adoption of policies, rules, regulations 8 and practices in furtherance thereof, and the use of judgment and 9 discretion in connection therewith, shall be limited only by the specific and express terms of this Agreement, and then only to the extent such 10 11 specific and express terms conform with law. 12 4.3 The District retains its right to amend, modify or rescind policies and 13 practices referred to in this Agreement as required in cases of emergency. 14 The determination of whether or not an emergency exists is solely within the discretion of the Board. However, prior to any declaration of 15 emergency, the District shall consult with the Association President or 16 17 designee. Emergencies shall not be declared capriciously, arbitrarily or in 18 retaliation for the exercise of employee rights. 19 ARTICLE 5: ASSOCIATION RIGHTS 20 5.1The Association and its members shall have the right to make 21 use of school equipment, buildings and facilities for Association 22 related matters. Such equipment shall include all types of audiovisual equipment. Such use shall be for Association 23 business and subject to reasonable regulation by the District. 24 The Association shall have the right to post notices of activities and 25 5.2matters of Association concern on Association bulletin boards, at least one 26 of which shall be provided in each school building in areas frequented by 27

1 teachers. The Association may use the District mail service and teacher 2 mailboxes for communications to teachers. Provisions will be made for any Association announcements during faculty meetings. 3 4 5.3 Authorized representatives of the Association shall be permitted to 5 transact official Association business on school property subject to reasonable regulation by the building administrator so long as said 6 activity does not interfere with the education process. 7 8 5.4 The District shall hold an annual new employee orientation and 9 other orientations as necessary. The District shall provide written notice of the date, time and location of all bargaining unit member orientation 10 meetings by electronic mail, to the Association President no later than ten 11 (10) calendar days in advance of any orientation meeting(s). In the event 12 13 the District is unable to comply with the stated advance notice, the 14 District shall, at the request of the Association, reschedule the orientation 15 meeting and provide the advance notice. If, however, there is an urgent 16 need critical to the employer's operations that was not reasonably foreseeable, the Association shall be provided as much notice as possible. 17 18 5.4.1 **Annual Orientation**: The Association shall be provided seventy-19 five (75) minutes of uninterrupted time to communicate with 20 bargaining unit members at the annual new bargaining unit 21 member orientation meetings. Such time will not be provided at 22 the end of the agenda. All school site administrators will be excused during the Association time. The Association will have 23 access to District audio visual equipment for Association 24 presentations. The Association will have District paid release time 25 to attend and participate in the annual new bargaining unit 26 27 member orientations meetings for the President and up to three (3)

1		bargaining unit members, selected by the Association if the annual
2		orientation meeting is held during contractual work hours.
3	5.4.2	Other Ongoing Orientations: Additional ongoing orientations
4		that occur during the year are typically smaller and less formal
5		than the annual orientation. During these orientations, the
6		Association President shall be allotted thirty (30) minutes of
7		uninterrupted time to communicate with bargaining unit members.
8	5.4.3	HTA is entitled to invite California Teachers Association (CTA)
9		staff to the Association portion of the new bargaining unit member
10		orientations.
11	5.4.4	Additionally, HTA will provide the District with HTA information
12		to be distributed to newly hired HTA/CTA/NEA bargaining unit
13		members in their employment packet.
14	5.4.5	The following information for each newly hired bargaining unit
15		member shall be delivered to the Association President in digital
16		spreadsheet format no later than thirty (30) days after the date of
17		hire:
18		1. Name
19		2. Home Address
20		3. Phone Numbers – work, home and cellular
21		4. Personal (non-District) Email Address
22		5. School Site
23		6. Date of Hire
24		7. Seniority Date

1	5.4.6	In addition, three (3) times during the contracted school year
2		(September 1, January 15 and May 1) the District shall deliver to
3		the Association President the following information in digital
4		spreadsheet format and hard copy for all bargaining unit members:
5		1. Name

8		4. Personal (non-District) Email Address

10		6. Date of Hire

19	5.4.7	Violations of this article shall be subject the grievance process as
20		outlined in Article 6 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement.
21		
22	5.5	The District will maintain its practice of providing the Association
23	with 1	District Governing Board meeting agendas, including all non-
24	confid	lential support materials to each building site and to the Association
25	Presid	dent.
26

1	5.6	Association Meetings on Wednesdays.
2		5.6.1 Association meetings on Wednesdays shall be scheduled as
3		follows:
4		5.6.1.1 Second and third Wednesdays of every month will be set
5		aside for Association meetings as required by the Hemet
6		Teachers Association
7	5.7	President's Release: The District and Association agree that the
8		Association President shall receive full release days (186) from his/her
9		assignment. (This number of days will always equal the number of teacher
10		contract days.)
11		5.7.1 Effective July 1, 2017, the Association shall pay half of the salary of
12		the current Association President, not to exceed fifty percent (50%)
13		of Column E, Step 8 on the certificated bargaining unit salary
14		schedule. The District shall pay the remainder of the
15		aforementioned salary. The District shall pay for all health and
16		welfare costs up to the cap for the President, as well as all statutory
17		benefits that are paid by the District on behalf of all other
18		certificated bargaining unit members.
19		5.7.2 It is understood that the Association President shall have access to
20		all District sites. The Association President shall have the right to
21		return to the site and assignment from which he/she was assigned
22		previous to release up to a maximum of four (4) consecutive years.
23		There shall be no loss of seniority, salary, or benefits.
24	5.8	Association Leave: Bargaining unit members designated by the
25		Association President may be granted release time from duties for
26		the purpose of conducting Association business including CTA/NEA
27		business under the following conditions:

1		5.8.1	The Association or CTA/NEA shall pay the daily rate of pay for
2			substitute(s) when one is secured.
3		5.8.2	No Unit Member shall exceed forty (40) days of Association release
4			in any school year. Any days not used shall not be carried over to
5			the next year. All Association Leave requested shall be made on
6			the District approved form. This form shall be forwarded to the
7			HTA President.
8	ART	ICLE 6	: GRIEVANCES
9	6.1	Defin	ition. A "grievance" is an allegation by a grievant that there has
10		been a	a violation, misapplication or misinterpretation of a provision of this
11		Agree	ment. A grievant may be a unit member or the Association.
12		6.1.1	For purposes of this Article a "day" is any day that is a regular
13			certificated employee workday. In the event a grievance is filed at
14			such a time that it cannot be resolved prior to a holiday break or
15			end of the school year, the time schedule of the grievance shall
16			resume on the next regular certificated work day. As an
17			alternative, if the grievant requests in writing, a "day" would be
18			any day on which the District Administration Office is open for
19			regular business.
20	6.2	Purp	ose. The purpose of this procedure is to secure, at the lowest
21		possib	le administrative level, a resolution of the grievance.
22		6.2.1	Nothing herein limits the right of an employee having a grievance
23			to discuss the matter informally with an appropriate member of
24			the District administration and to have a grievance adjusted
25			without intervention or representation by the Association,
26			provided that such adjustment is consistent with the terms of this
27			Agreement.

1 6.2.2 Any change in grievance forms will be developed jointly by the 2 District and the Association. 3 6.3 **Time.** Since it is important that a grievance be resolved as rapidly as 4 possible, the time limits specified in this Article shall be considered 5 maximums. Failure of the grievant to act within these time limits bars further appeal. Failure of the District to give a decision within these time 6 7 limits permits the grievant to proceed to the next step. 8 6.4 **Representation.** An employee with a grievance may represent 9 her/himself through Level III of her/his grievance procedure, or at the 10 employee's sole option, may choose to be represented by the Association. 11 If the grievant is not represented by the Association, the District will give 12 the Association notification of the proposed resolution. Any response 13 thereto must be made by the Association within ten (10) days of receipt of such notification. 14 6.5 **Release Time.** Hearings and conferences under this procedure shall be 15 conducted at a time and place which will afford an opportunity for all 16 17 persons entitled to be present to that end and will be held, insofar as 18 possible, after the regular hours of instruction or during the non-teaching 19 time of personnel involved. When such hearings and conferences are held 20 at the request of the District during the regular workday, all employees 21 whose presence is required shall be released without loss of pay for those 22 hours they are required to attend such hearing or conference. This provision shall apply only to the grievant, and to her/his representative if 23 that representative is an employee. Only one representative per 24 25 grievance will be released by the District without loss of pay. 26 6.6 **Level I.** Prior to the filing of a written grievance, an employee shall 27 attempt to resolve the matter by meeting with the immediate supervisor.

1 If the grievant feels that the immediate supervisor is not an appropriate 2 person with whom to discuss the matter, the grievant may confer with the Personnel Administrator, who may designate the appropriate 3 administrator for the purpose of the Level I conference. 4 5 6.7 **Level II.** If the grievance is not satisfactorily resolved at Level I, a written grievance must be delivered to the employee's immediate 6 supervisor or appropriate administrator within twenty (20) days of the 7 8 purported incident. The written grievance shall be set forth in a clear, 9 concise manner, and shall deal with the specifics of the purported 10 violation of this Agreement, including the factual circumstance 11 surrounding the purported violation. The written grievance shall set forth the previous decision, if any, by the immediate supervisor or appropriate 12 13 administrator at Level I. Within ten (10) days of receipt of the grievance, the grievant and 14 6.7.1the supervisor shall meet to discuss the grievance and attempt to 15 arrive at a mutually satisfactory solution. Within ten (10) days of 16 17 this meeting, the supervisor shall respond in writing to the 18 grievant with a copy to the Association President. 19 6.8 **Level III.** An employee not satisfied with the Level II decision may 20 within ten (10) days of receipt of the written response submit a written 21 appeal to the Superintendent or designee. 22 6.8.1 The written statement of appeal shall contain a clear, concise 23 statement of the reasons for appeal to the Superintendent or designee, a copy of the original grievance, and a copy of the Level 24 II decision. 25 6.8.2 Within ten (10) days of receipt of the grievance, the grievant and 26 27 the Superintendent or designee shall meet to discuss the

1 grievance and attempt to arrive at a mutually satisfactory 2 solution. Within ten (10) days of this meeting, the Superintendent or designee shall respond in writing to the 3 grievant with a copy to the Association President. 4 5 6.9 **Level IV.** An employee not satisfied with the Level III decision may within ten (10) days of the receipt of the written response request the 6 Association to submit the grievance to mediation. Within ten (10) days of 7 receipt of the request from the grievant, the Superintendent/designee 8 9 shall request of the State Mediation and Conciliation Service to provide a mediator. The function of the mediator shall be to assist the parties to 10 11 achieve a mutually satisfactory resolution to the grievance. The mediation shall be scheduled at a mutually agreeable time for both the 12 13 District and Association representative. 14 6.10 Level V. An employee not satisfied with the Level IV decision may within ten (10) days of the receipt of the written response request the 15 Association to submit the grievance to arbitration. If the Association 16 17 decides to submit the grievance to arbitration, it may within ten (10) days 18 of receipt of the request from the grievant, give written notice to the 19 Superintendent of its intent to submit the grievance to arbitration. If any 20 question arises as to the arbitrability of the grievance, such question will 21 be ruled upon first by the arbitrator. 22 6.10.1 Within ten (10) days after receipt by the District of the written 23 notice of intent to arbitrate, the Superintendent or designee and the Association will attempt to agree on a mutually acceptable 24 arbitrator and to obtain a commitment from the arbitrator to 25 serve. If the parties are unable to agree, a request for a list of 26 27 seven arbitrators may be made to the American Arbitration

1 Association by either party. The parties will then be bound by the 2 rules and procedures of the American Arbitration Association in the selection of an arbitrator, and that arbitrator shall proceed 3 under the Voluntary Labor Arbitration Rules of the American 4 5 Arbitration Association. The arbitrator's decision will be in writing and will set forth 6 6.10.2 findings of fact, reasoning and conclusions on the issues 7 submitted. The arbitrator, in rendering her or his opinion, shall 8 9 not amend, modify, nullify, ignore, or add to the provisions of this Agreement. The arbitrator's authority shall be limited to deciding 10 only the issue or issues presented in writing by the District and 11 the grievant or the grievant's representative. The arbitrator's 12 13 decision shall be based upon the arbitrator's interpretation of the meaning or application of the language of this Agreement. The 14 decision of the arbitrator will be final and binding and will be 15 submitted to the District and the Association. 16 The costs of the compensation to the arbitrator and the 17 reimbursement of the arbitrator's travel and subsistence 18 19 expenses, as well as the cost of a hearing room, will be borne 20 equally by the District and the Association. All other costs will be 21 borne by the party incurring the costs. 22 ARTICLE 7: HOURS OF EMPLOYMENT 7.1 Classroom Teachers. 23 Work Year. There will be four non-student days prior to the 24 7.1.1school year: two Professional Development days, one meeting day, 25 and one teacher prep day. There will be one non-student teacher 26 27 prep day immediately following the last student day of the school

1 year. The work year shall be as provided for on the school 2 calendar, and shall not exceed 186 days. 7.1.2 Work Week. The regular work week shall be Monday through 3 Friday except as such a week might be changed by national, state, 4 5 or local holidays, or the school calendar. Work Day. Employees shall be on the work site prior to the 6 7.1.3 beginning of the student's regular school day in accordance with 7 the before school duty schedule in effect at the site to which the 8 9 employee is assigned, and shall remain on the worksite after the students' regular school day ends in accordance with the after 10 school duty schedule in effect at said site and in keeping with the 11 district-wide duty day. If program assignments are such that 12 13 different employee assignments require different daily beginning and ending times, these times will be determined by the District, 14 however each such assignment shall be in compliance with 7.1.4 15 below. 16 7.1.4 In accordance with past practices, it is recognized that the total 17 18 amount of time regularly required to be spent at a school site by 19 employees may vary, due to differences in assignment, extended 20 day schedules, conferences and for other reasons. Duty time will 21 be no fewer minutes than the classroom teacher duty day unless 22 mutually determined and agreed upon between the employee and 23 the principal. **Lunch.** All employees shall be entitled to one, duty free, 24 7.1.5uninterrupted lunch period per day of no less than thirty (30) 25 minutes in length. 26

1	7.1.6	Duty M	linutes. All certificated employees will have the same
2		length o	of regular duty day exclusive of the lunch period as set
3		forth be	elow:
4		7.1.6.1	Elementary teachers, including grades TK through 8 in
5			TK -8 schools, shall be assigned by the site administrator
6			no more than ninety (90) minutes per week of student
7			supervision duty to be performed at recess and/or before
8			or after school. Middle School teachers in sixth (6 th)
9			through eighth (8th) grade shall be assigned by the site
10			administrator no more than five hundred (500) minutes
11			per year of student supervision before or after school.
12		7.1.6.2	Elementary teachers, including grades 1-8, shall have a
13			total of 170 minutes of preparation periods per week,
14			including one period of at least 50 minutes unless
15			teachers in grades 6-8 are assigned to a middle school
16			schedule as indicated above. All such preparation periods
17			shall be provided in blocks of at least 30 minutes per
18			period.
19			7.1.6.2.1 Elementary Functional Skills, BESTT and
20			Autism Moderate/Severe teachers in grades 1-5 shall
21			receive compensation outlined in paragraph D of
22			Appendix C in lieu of 120 minutes of the 170 minutes
23			prep time specified in 7.1.6.2.

7		7.4.1 Bargaining Unit Members shall not be required to attend
8		more than two (2) evening events per year at the elementary level
9		and three (3) evening events per year at the secondary level.
10		Teachers at K-8 campuses shall be required to attend no more than

The goal is to equalize 8 9 the preparation time during the two conference weeks for those teachers who provide parent conferences. 10 7.7 Adult Education Teachers. 11 7.7.1**Employee Work hours.** The lengths of the work year, work 12 13 week, and work day as well as the number of employees in Adult Education are dependent upon fluctuations in average daily 14 attendance, categorical funding changes, and community needs. 15 The District reserves the right to add to, reduce, or eliminate the 16 work hours of any employee in Adult Education based upon such 17 18 fluctuations. 19 7.7.2**Necessary Attendance.** The District shall determine the 20 amount of student attendance necessary for the scheduling, maintenance and/or cancellation of any Adult Education class. 21 22 7.7.3 **On-Site Time.** Employees assigned as classroom teachers will be 23 at the worksite before the beginning of their class and remain on duty at the worksite, except for authorized break periods, for the 24 period of the class. 25 26 27

Catastrophic leave pay may be available to a 25 certificated employee as set forth herein pursuant to the provisions of 26 Education Code 44043.5 inclusive. Catastrophic leave pay shall consist of 27

the amount of sick leave days that are donated to the affected certificated					
employees by other certificated employees. "Catastrophic illness or injury"					
shall mean an illness or injury: (a) that is expected to incapacitate the					
certificated employee for an extended period of time; (b) that incapacitates					
a member or the certificated employee's family and which incapacity					
requires the certificated employee to take time off from work for an					
extended period of time to care for the family member; or (c) taking					
extended time off work creates a financial hardship for the certificated					
employee because he/she has exhausted all of his/her sick leave and other					
paid time off.					
12.12.1 In the event the unit member is personally unable to apply					
for catastrophic leave, an immediate family member or unit member's					
agent may make the request for the applicant. This must be verified with					
a physician's note.					
12.12.2 Donations of sick leave or comp time shall be made in blocks					
of one day per donating certificated employee. A certificated employee who					
donates sick leave credits shall be required to have a sick leave balance					
equivalent to ten (10) days following the donations. Donations will be					
calculated day for day.					
12.12.3 No certificated employee shall give more than three (3) days					
of sick leave or comp time for each certificated employee's request.					
12.12.3.1 A bargaining unit member may donate more than three					
(3) days of sick leave or comp time to a family member as defined in					
Article 12.2., provided the bargaining unit member qualifies					
pursuant to Article 12.12.2.					
12.12.4 A committee comprised of two (2) bargaining unit members					
appointed by the President of the Association and two representatives of					

1 administration shall administer the catastrophic leave provision and shall 2 approve or disapprove all applications. An applicant shall be required to provide proof that a catastrophic illness or injury exists. 3 12.12.5 When the application is based on the catastrophic illness or 4 5 injury of a member of the certificated employee's family, all required statements, and verifications shall be related to the affected family 6 member. In addition, the certificated employee shall attach a written 7 statement indicating the circumstances that require the employee to be 8 9 absent from work. 10 12.12.6 The certificated employee shall be required to utilize all of 11 his/her available regular sick leave and comp time prior to the receipt of 12 donated time credits. 13 12.12.7 "Member" of the certificated employee's family shall be defined as set forth in Article 12.2. 14 12.15 Military Leave. A bargaining unit member shall be entitled to full pay 15 and benefits for the first 30 calendar days and a maximum of 30 days in 16 17 any fiscal year, as required by Education Code 45059 and Military and Veterans Code 395, when on military leave and shall retain all rights and 18 19 privileges granted by law arising out of the exercise of military leave. 20 ARTICLE 13: SAFETY CONDITIONS 21 The District acknowledges its obligation to maintain a safe working 13.1 22 environment for unit members and for prescribing appropriate safety standards. In this regard, the District intends to be guided by the 23 California Occupational Safety and Health Act (Labor Code Section 6300). 24 25 Unit members acknowledge their obligation to comply with District safety 13.2 26 standards, including accident and safety reports, and to practice basic safety measures. Failure to do so, may be grounds for discipline. 27

Unit members shall report to their immediate supervisor suspected unsafe conditions in writing. The District shall supply a report form for reporting unsafe conditions. 13.4 Unit members shall report to their immediate supervisor any abuse of school personnel, assault or battery upon school personnel, or any threat of force or violence directed toward school personnel which occurs at any time or place and is related to any school activity. Unit members are obligated to prepare any reports required by the District relating to such incidents. The District will facilitate actions against students or adults who abuse, assault, insult or upbraid employees. The District shall, upon request, respond to the affected employee within five (5) working days as to what action has been taken or is being considered by the District with respect to the incident in question. 13.4.1 Employees who have been attacked, assaulted, or battered, or who have been threatened with injury by someone the employee reasonably believes is capable of inflicting such harm, shall immediately report the incident to their immediate supervisor and to appropriate law enforcement authorities if they desire. The District will investigate all reports of suspected unsafe conditions and 13.5 shall take steps it deems necessary to correct conditions determined to be unsafe. The District shall, upon request, respond to the Association or the employee within five (5) working days as to what remedial action is being considered to correct the unsafe condition. The District shall supply and maintain adequate means for 13.6 communication between a teacher and other staff members at the school for emergency situations.

The District shall maintain a Safety Committee, which shall consist of, among others, representatives of the certificated bargaining unit. Any bargaining unit member may report a safety concern by following the process outlined in the site handbook and/or on the District website. To begin this process, the unit member shall file an Unsafe Conditions Report with site administration. 13.7.1 Beginning with the 2019-20 school year, the Safety Committee shall send a joint communique regarding the law governing lactation accommodations to all employees. The communique shall be reviewed annually, prior to September 30th, and updated when necessary. No unit member shall be required to perform duties under conditions 13.8 which pose an immediate threat of serious physical harm to the unit member provided the unit member has reported the condition to her/his site administrator and exhausted reasonable means to correct the condition. In exercising the foregoing right, unit members shall not neglect the responsibility to provide for the safety of students. 13.9 The District shall indemnify and hold harmless from liability any unit member who performs, within the scope of her/his authority, specialized health care services. Unit members shall receive proper and adequate training in those health care services they are asked to perform. Notwithstanding the above, and with the exception of nurses, no unit member will be required to perform catheterizations, diapering, injections, ileostomies, colostomies, gastrostomies, tracheostomy, suction, oxygen administration, gavage feeding or draining. Nothing herein shall be interpreted as preventing a unit member from performing the health care

1	services described herein if the unit member volunteers in writing and has
2	received proper training from a certified specialist in these procedures.
3	13.10 No bargaining unit member shall be asked or directed to transport pupils
4	in private vehicles.
5	13.11 The District will inform employees of the scope of protection for personal
6	liability under the District's liability coverage for employees acting as
7	agents of the District.
8	13.12 Each unit member shall be given a copy of the school site's student
9	discipline procedures at the start of the school year.
10	13.12.1 In accordance with Education Code Section 48910, a unit member
11	shall have the right to suspend a student from their class for that day
12	and/or the day following, while providing students with disabilities their
13	due process under the Individuals with Disabilities Education
14	Improvement Act. Site handbooks shall contain Education Code 48910
15	and procedures relating to a unit member's suspension of a student.
16	13.13 In accordance with Education Code Section 49079, the District shall notify
17	a unit member of any pupil enrolled in her/his class who has engaged in,
18	or is reasonably suspected to have engaged in, within the last three years,
19	any of the acts subject to suspension or expulsion under the Education
20	Code Section 48900 that are reportable under Section 49079 when such
21	information is made known to the District. The District shall provide the
22	information to the teacher through records the District maintains in its
23	ordinary course of business or receives from a law enforcement agency.
24	Any information received by a unit member pursuant to this section shall
25	be received in confidence for the limited purpose for which it is intended
26	and shall not be disseminated by the teacher. Violation of this

1	confidentiality requirement by a unit member shall be grounds for				
2	discipline.				
3	13.14 Use of surveillance cameras				
4	13.14.1 In accordance with Education code section 51512, the District may				
5	not place any electronic listening or recording device (including				
6	surveillance cameras) in any classroom of the elementary and				
7	secondary schools without the prior consent of the teacher and the				
8	principal of the school.				
9	13.14.2. The following applies to the use of surveillance cameras at school site				
10	areas outside of a classroom.				
11	13.14.2.1 Signs shall be posted disclosing the use of surveillance				
12	cameras.				
13	13.14.2.2 Surveillance cameras shall not be used as de-facto time

15	13.14.2.3 Surveillance cameras shall not be used in any formal or

17	13.14.2.4 Information garnered from surveillance cameras may only be				
18	utilized to enact employee discipline when there is alleged

21	ARTICLE 14: CLASS SIZE				
22	14.1 The District shall maintain a District-wide staffing ratio of thirty (30)				
23	students or less per classroom teacher. This shall not be interpreted to				
24	mean that individual classes will not exceed thirty (30) students.				
25	14.1.1 Subject to 14.1.1.1, beginning July 1, 2015 the District shall comply				
26	with the state of California's Class Size Grade Span adjustment				
27	program enacted in 2013 to make reductions each year, until a				

1		staffing ratio of 24:1 is achieved in grades TK-3 at each elementary	
2		(K-5) and K-8 school.	
3	14.1.1.1 Pursuant to Education Code section 42238.02(d)(3)(B),		
4		(C)(D), the collectively bargained alternative annual average	
5		class enrollment for each school site shall not exceed 26:1 for	
6		grades TK-3.	
7	14.2	For the purposes of Section 14.1, the number of classroom teachers used to	
8		compute the above ratio shall not include special education teachers,	
9		counselors, librarians, adult education teachers, speech therapists,	
10		psychologists, administrative personnel, nurses and District elementary	
11		music teachers, teachers on special assignment, academic coaches nor will	
12		it include adult education students.	
13	14.3	In addition to the District-wide ratio of 30:1, as stated in 14.1, no	
14		individual elementary class (defined as grades K-5 except for Cottonwood	
15		and Idyllwild, where it will be grades K-8 and Hamilton, where it will be	
16		defined as including only grades K-5) shall exceed 34, except when to meet	
17		that limit, the District would be required to construct, modify or expand

16		of up to eighteen (18) minutes. This period shall not require preparation
17		nor shall it require grading. Students shall receive pass/fail. This shall
18		not be counted toward student contacts.
19	ARTI	ICLE 15: EMPLOYEE EVALUATION AND OBSERVATION
20	PRO	<u>CEDURES</u>
21	15.1	The District shall evaluate all permanent bargaining unit members no
22		less than once every two (2) years, except that whenever any permanent
23		certificated employee receives an unsatisfactory evaluation, the employee
24		shall be evaluated at least annually until she/he achieves a positive
25		evaluation or is separated from the District. The evaluation form shall
26		specifically state whether the evaluation is satisfactory or unsatisfactory.
27		All probationary bargaining unit members shall be evaluated no less than

The certificated employee or the evaluator may withdraw consent at any time. **Formal Observations** – The evaluation of a unit member shall be based on the direct observation of a unit member's work. No unit member's evaluation will be based on hearsay information. Assistance Plan - If a unit member receives an overall evaluation of one (1) and is being referred to PAR the evaluator must attach a copy of an assistance plan to the evaluation form. The assistance plan shall be given to the Joint Panel and the PAR provider. 15.1.1 Administrators shall be trained in the use of the evaluation form, including but not limited to the elements of the California Standards for the Teaching Profession, descriptions of teaching practice. 15.2 Evaluation is defined as the process of appraising the effectiveness of the performance of employees. Procedures for evaluation shall be based on, but not limited to: 15.2.1 The gathering of information about the employee's performance in the classroom; 15.2.2 Assessing the quality of such performance; 15.2.3 Communicating to the employee the assessment of the quality of the performance;

1		15.2.4 Recommending, if necessary, changes to improve the employee's			
2		performance.;			
3		15.2.5 No member of the unit shall evaluate another unit member			
4		without the agreement of both unit members;			
5	15.3	Prior to the beginning of the formal evaluation process, which includes all			
6		written formal observations, a face to face conference shall be held			
7		between the evaluatee and evaluator. They shall discuss and enumerate			
8		the elements upon which the evaluation may be based and attempt to			
9		reach agreement thereon. The elements shall include, but will not be			
10		limited to, the goals and objectives of the teacher. Both physical and			
11		nonphysical constraints on reaching those goals shall be discussed, along			
12		with other aspects of expected performance outside the classroom. The			
13		elements for evaluation shall be committed to writing whether or not			
14		agreement is reached and a copy of what has been written shall be

The unit member shall be provided the opportunity to attach a written reaction or response which shall become part of the permanent records. A copy of the evaluation report shall be signed by the evaluator as well as the evaluatee. A copy of the evaluation report shall be given to the employee, at District expense, a copy shall be placed in the employee's personnel file, and a copy retained by the evaluator. An employee's refusal to meet over the evaluation within the prescribed timelines, or refusal to sign the evaluation form, shall be considered a waiver of these requirements by the employee. A permanent classroom teacher who receives an unsatisfactory rating in 15.9 his/her final evaluation in areas of subject matter knowledge, teaching methods or instruction shall be evaluated in the succeeding year and shall participate in the District's Peer Assistance and Review (PAR) Program designed to improve the unsatisfactory performance. The PAR program structure is contained in Article 17. For the purposes of the PAR program, evaluations shall be completed by the appropriate site administrator or other administrative designee. 15.10 Pursuant to the provisions of this Article, an evaluation procedure for counselors and other non-classroom teacher bargaining unit members shall be discussed between the assigned evaluator and bargaining unit member at the beginning of each school year. 15.11 The District retains the ultimate responsibility for the evaluation and assessment of performance of each unit member, subject to the procedural requirements as set forth in this Article. Accordingly, grievances arising under this Article shall be limited to a claim that evaluation procedures

1 have been violated. However, nothing herein shall preclude the unit 2 member from contesting the substance of any evaluation which is used in any disciplinary proceeding. 3 4 ARTICLE 16: COMPLAINT PROCEDURE 5 16.1 Complaints received by the site administrator, supervisor, a central office administrator or Board member, regarding a unit member will be 6 reported to the unit member within seven (7) days of the complaint, except 7 8 that criminal charges shall be reported to the appropriate authority. 9 16.2 Prior to lodging a complaint, and within seven (7) days of the 10 complainant's knowledge of the event giving rise to the complaint, the 11 complainant shall attempt to discuss the complaint with the specific unit 12 member(s) involved. If the complainant is unwilling or unable to meet 13 with the unit member(s), the site administrator shall attempt to arrange a meeting between the complainant and the unit member(s). If the 14 complaint is satisfactorily resolved at this step, then the complaint 15 procedure is deemed completed. 16 17 16.3 If the complaint is not resolved in the meeting between the complainant 18 and unit member, and if the complaint is deemed to be of a nature that 19 cannot reasonably be ignored, the complainant shall place the complaint 20 in writing and sign the complaint. If the site administrator or supervisor 21 puts the complaint in writing, she/he shall have it signed by the 22 complainant. A copy of the complaint shall be given to the unit member 23 within seven (7) days. Except as provided herein, the employee's site administrator or supervisor 24 16.4 25 shall schedule a meeting between the complainant and employee within 26 fifteen (15) days of the complaint being brought to the administrator's or 27 supervisor's attention. The employee and/or complainant may have a

1		representative at any meeting. If after an initial interview it is the
2		opinion of the site administrator that a second meeting between the
3		complainant and teacher would not assist in resolving the matter, the site
4		administrator may elect to conduct further discussion as an intermediary.
5	16.5	Within fifteen (15) days of the meeting described in Section 16.4 taking

12		personally or by mail at least seventy-two (72) hours before the time for

- b) On those occasions when a teacher in a self-contained class takes students from another class because a substitute has not been provided for an absent teacher, the teacher shall receive one-half hour of compensation time for each half day in excess of one hour that the additional students are assigned. At the end of each school year, unused compensatory time shall be assigned. At the end of each school year, unused compensatory time shall be compensated at the Appendix C III, R&D rate .080%.
- c) Such service shall first be solicited on a voluntary basis. In the event that no volunteer can be obtained, employees may be assigned on an occasional basis.
- d) For Secondary teachers compensatory time off may be granted in portions of one (1) period or more upon prior approval by the principal or designee. Under normal circumstances, employees may be permitted to take no more than two (2) consecutive days of compensatory time off. Under unusual circumstances and upon written application, a principal may authorize up to three (3) consecutive days of compensatory time off.

For elementary teachers, compensatory time may be taken in half or full day increments, subject to the same restrictions for secondary teachers.

e) No compensation time may be taken the last two (2) weeks of each semester except upon prior approval by the principal.

X. Substitute Service Compensation

Teachers who substitute for teachers who are absent due to scheduled school business, illness, or emergencies shall be covered by the following provisions:

- a) Secondary teachers who provide substitute coverage for another employee during his/her assigned preparation period shall receive compensatory time on a period-for period basis. At the end of the school year, unused compensatory time shall be compensated at the Appendix C III, R&D rate .080%.
- b) On those occasions when a teacher in a self-contained class takes students from another class because a substitute has not been provided for an absent teacher, the teacher shall receive one-half hour of compensation time for each half day in access of one hour that the additional students are assigned. At the end of each school year, unused compensatory time shall be assigned. At the end of each school year, unused compensatory time shall be compensated at the Appendix C III, R&D rate .080%.
- c) Such service shall first be solicited on a voluntary basis. In the event that no volunteer can be obtained, employees may be assigned on an occasional basis.
- d) For Secondary teachers compensatory time off may be granted in portions of one (1) period or more upon prior approval by the principal or designee. Under normal circumstances, employees may be permitted to take no more than two (2) consecutive days of compensatory time off. Under unusual circumstances and upon written application, a principal may authorize up to three (3) consecutive days of compensatory time off.
 - For elementary teachers, compensatory time may be taken in half or full day increments, subject to the same restrictions for secondary teachers.
- e) No compensation time may be taken the last two (2) weeks of each semester except upon prior approval by the principal.

HEMET UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT and HEMET TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

Dual Language Immersion Program

Recruiting and Retention
Effective July 1, 2017

The Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) and the Hemet Teachers Association (HTA) have a mutual interest in the recruitment and retention of teachers for the Dual Language Immersion (DLI) Program offered within the district.

Therefore, HUSD and HTA enter into the following agreement to recruit and retain teachers for the District's DLI Program by providing the following incentive payment and program stipend:

1.1 Eligibility

- 1.1 Teachers who hold a Bilingual, Crosscultural, Language, and Academic Development (BCLAD) Certificate and:
 - (a) Who are actively teaching in the DLI program OR
 - (b) Are hired for a future assignment in the DLI program shall be eligible for the incentive.

2.0 Incentive Payment

- 2.1 Eligible teachers new to HUSD shall receive a one-time signing incentive of \$1,000 to be paid in their second pay warrant after hire OR
- 2.2 Eligible teachers currently employed by HUSD shall receive a one-time transfer incentive of \$1,000 to be paid in their second pay warrant after being assigned to the program.

3.0 Program Stipend

- 3.1 Eligible teachers who are currently teaching in a designated DLI classroom shall receive a program stipend of \$1,500 annually.
- 3.2 Eligible teachers who are hired for the DLI program and are preparing to teach in a designated DLI classroom within one year shall receive a program stipend of \$1,500 annually.
 - (a) During this one year time frame, this teacher shall actively prepare to implement the DLI program.
- 3.3 Eligible teachers who are hired for the DLI program, but are not currently teaching or preparing to teach in a DLI classroom within one year, shall receive a program stipend of \$500 annually.
- (a) These teachers shall actively participate in the implementation of the schoolwide DLI program.
- 3.4 All participating teachers in the DLI program shall also receive the annual BCLAD stipend of \$750 as outlined in Appendix C-4 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement.
- 3.5 Annual program stipends shall be distributed in equal monthly payments.

This agreement shall constitute the entire agreement of the parties and may only be modified or amended in writing, signed by both parties. This agreement shall be implemented beginning in the 2017-18 school year and is subject to approval by HTA and HUSD Board of Education. This MOU shall be placed in the Collective Bargaining Agreement as "Appendix C-6" upon completion of the 2018-17 negotiations.

Appendix E

YOUR RIGHTS Under the

Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 And The California Family Rights Act

The Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (FMLA) and the California Family Rights Act (CFRA) require the District to provide up to 12 work weeks of unpaid, job-protected leave with health benefits maintained at the same level as if the employee were working to "eligible" employees for certain family and medical reasons. Employees are eligible if they have been employed by the District for at least one year, and have actually worked at least 1,250 hours in the 12 months prior to taking the leave, excluding paid and unpaid leaves. Full-time teachers are presumed to have worked 1,250 hours unless the District can prove otherwise.

Eligible employees may take 12 work weeks of FMLA and/or CFRA leave in a fiscal year, July 1 through June 30. Leave taken under the FMLA shall run concurrently with leave taken under the CFRA except for pregnancy, childbirth, or related disabilities, In these instances, the employee shall be entitled to 12 work weeks of leave under the FMLA, which will run concurrently with available paid leave and Pregnancy Disability Leave Act (PDLA). Following the exhaustion of FMLA and PDLA leave, the employee may be entitled to an additional 12 work weeks of leave to bond with a new child within one year of the child's birth, adoption, or foster care placement under the CFRA. To the extent that an employee has exhausted his or her sick leave after exhausting FMLA and PDLA leave, the certificated employee may be entitled to differential pay during the course of his or her bonding leave.

Reasons for Taking Leave:

Unpaid leave must be granted to eligible employees for **any** of the following reasons:

- To care for the employee's child after birth, or placement for adoption or foster care, within one year of the birth or placement;
- To care for the employee's spouse, dependent child, or parent/guardian, with a serious health condition; or
- Under the CFRA only and effective January 1, 2005, to care for the employee's registered domestic partner with a serious health condition; or
- For the employee's own serious health condition that makes the employee unable to perform the essential functions or his or her job.
- For any qualifying exigency arising out of the fact that the employee's spouse, son, daughter, or parent is on active duty military duty or has been notified of an impending call or order to active duty in the U.S. National Guard or Reserves in support of a contingency operation. To the extent that a family member is a service member with a serious injury or illness, the employee may take up to twenty-six (26) weeks of unpaid leave in a single twelve (12) month period.

Where the employee's absence is for his or her own serious health condition, the employee shall substitute available sick leave and extended illness leave for the unpaid leave, which shall run concurrently with the FMLA/CFRA leave.

FMLA and/or CFRA leave may be taken intermittently or on a reduced-work schedule where medically necessary or where the treating physician indicates that the employee is needed to care for the ill family member on an intermittent basis. Where the leave is to care for a new child, the leave must be taken in at least two-week increments except on two occasions. If both parents of the new child are employees for the District then their combined bonding leave may not exceed 12 weeks.

Advance Notice and Medical Certification

The employee may be required to provide leave notice and medical certification. Taking of leave may be denied or delayed if requirements are not met.

- The employee must endeavor him or herself to give the District ample and reasonable notice of his or her intention to elect to use FMLA-related leave. The employee must provide 30 days advance notice when the need for the leave is "foreseeable." If proper notice is not provided, the District may delay the commencement of the leave. Where the need for the leave is not foreseeable, the employee shall provide notice as soon as reasonably possible, with the preference that notice be given within two work days from the need for leave to be taken.
- Where the absence is for the employee's own serious health condition, the District may require a medical certification. When the District has a good-faith (not arbitrary or capricious) reason to doubt the validity of a medical certification, the District may require a second opinion at the District's expense. If the second opinion differs with the opinion of the certification, the District may require, at its expense, that the employee obtain the opinion of a third health care provider, which is to be designated or approved jointly by the employer and the employee, concerning the medical certification. The opinion of the third health care provider concerning the medical certification shall be considered to be final and shall be binding on the employer and the employee.
- Where the leave is for the employee's own serious health condition, the District may require
 a medical certification that the employee is able to return to work and perform the essential
 functions of his or her position.

Job Benefits and Protection

- For the duration of FMLA and/or CFRA leave, the District must maintain the employee's health coverage under any "group health plan". If the employee is normally required to pay any portion of the insurance premium, he or she must continue to pay that portion during the FMLA and/or CFRA leave.
- Upon return from FMLA and/or CFRA leave, in most circumstances, employees must be
 restored to their original or equivalent positions with equivalent pay, benefits, and other
 employment terms.
- The use of FMLA and/or CFRA leave cannot result in the loss of any employment benefit that accrued prior to the start of an employee's leave.

Unlawful Acts by Employers

The FMLA and CFRA makes it unlawful for any employer to:

- Interfere with, restrain, or deny the exercise of any right provided under the FMLA and/or CFRA:
- Discharge or discriminate against any person for opposing any practice made unlawful by the FMLA and/or CFRA or for involvement in any proceeding under or relating to the FMLA and/or CFRA.

Enforcement:

- The U.S. Department of Labor is authorized to investigate and resolve complaints of violations of the FMLA;
- The California Department of Fair Employment and Housing is authorized to investigate and resolve complaints of violations of the CFRA;
- An eligible employee may bring a civil action against an employer for violations.

The FMLA and CFRA do not affect any Federal or State law prohibiting discrimination, or supersede any State or local law or collective bargaining agreement which provides greater family or medical leave rights.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

AND THE HEMET TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

This memorandum of understanding is entered into by and between the Hemet Unified School District (District) and the Hemet Teachers Association, CTA/NEA, (HTA), concerning year-round schools and shall modify the current collective bargaining agreement between the District and HTA and shall expire with that agreement if not renewed.

1. Vacancies at Year-Round Schools

- a. When a vacancy occurs at a year-round school site, the other teachers at the same grade level as the vacant position/track assignment at that site shall have first choice at the vacancy. If more than one teacher requests the track change to the vacancy, the teacher with the most seniority shall be assigned to the vacancy unless there is a need for an authorized teacher for ELL compliance.
- b. The vacancy then created by that change shall be opened up to all other teachers at the school site. The District shall use the following criteria in selecting the teacher to fill the vacancy. The criteria are not ranked in any priority order.
 - i. Certification (credentials held)
 - ii. Qualifications (education and training)
 - iii. Legal compliance issues; for example, where the class serves English Language Learners (ELL) and whether the teacher holds a CLAD certificate or other certificate or credential appropriate to teach ELL.
 - iv. Seniority
 - v. Experience at the grade level in which the vacancy occurs
- c. Nothing in this Agreement shall permit teachers to "bump" teachers from existing positions and track assignments. This Agreement shall apply only where a position/track assignment is vacant.

2. Communications with Off-Track Teachers at Year-Round Schools

When a teacher assigned to a year-round school site is off-track, he or she may leave a self-addressed envelope with the school office and

request that school bulletins be sent to him or her at home during his or her off-track period. If the teacher does not leave a self-addressed envelope, he or she shall not receive school bulletins during his or her offtrack period.

This Agreement shall constitute the entire agreement of the parties and may only be modified or amended in writing, signed by both parties.

This memorandum of understanding is entered into by and between the Hemet Unified School District (District) and the Hemet Teachers Association, CTA/NEA, (HTA), concerning the instructional and work year, and instructional and duty minutes, at year-round schools, and shall modify the current collective bargaining agreement between the District and HTA and shall expire with that agreement if not renewed.

- Notwithstanding Section 7.1.1 of the collective bargaining agreement, effective with the 2001-2002 school year, the instructional year for year-round school sites shall be 175 days, and the work year for certificated employees assigned to year-round school sites shall be 179 days. The instructional year and work year for year-round school sites for the 2001-2002 school year is attached as Exhibit A. All other provisions of Section 7.1.1 shall remain in full force and effect for certificated employees assigned to year-round school sites.
- Notwithstanding Section 7.1.6 of the collective bargaining agreement, effective with the 2001-2002 school year, the instructional minutes for regular duty days at year-round school sites shall be increased by ten (10) minutes per day as follows:

Kindergarten: 210 Instructional Minutes Grades 1-3: 313 Instructional Minutes

324 Instructional Minutes Grades 4-5:

The total regular duty day for certificated employees assigned to year-round school sites shall increase by ten (10) minutes to 389 minutes per regular duty day. All other provisions of Section 7.1.6 shall remain in full force and effect for certificated employees assigned to year-round school sites.

This Agreement shall constitute the entire agreement of the parties and may only be modified or amended in writing, signed by both parties.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES AND PROCESSES

- 1. The Insurance Committee shall consist of three (3) HTA representatives appointed by the HTA President and two (2) District representatives appointed by the Superintendent. The Insurance Committee shall meet at least quarterly and shall be responsible for:
 - (A) Selecting Co-Chairs that consist of one representative from HTA and one representative from the District. The Co-Chairs shall jointly create the agenda for all Insurance Committee meetings.
 - (B) Reviewing all expenditures from the HTA Holding Account to confirm that the funds are being used in accordance with the Agreement and with the terms of the Plan.
 - (C) Reviewing the results of the annual audit and actuarial study of the HTA Holding Account.
 - (D) Reviewing the Benefit Plan Budget, and make recommendations to the Superintendent and HTA Executive Board on adjustments to be made to unit members' monthly contributions.
 - (E) Making recommendations to the HTA Executive Board as to the choice of carriers, plan designs and cost containment suggestions associated with major medical, dental, vision, life insurance and voluntary products. All recommendations are subject to approval by the HTA Representative Council and/or HTA membership. Once approved, HTA Executive Board will forward the recommendation (s) to the Superintendent.
 - (F) Reviewing and making recommendations to the Superintendent and HTA Executive Board as to the use of HTA's waive dollars (the negotiated CAP amount that the District contributes to the HTA Holding Account for all employees who opt out of District offered benefits) to offset the costs of all health and welfare expenditures.
 - (G) Ensuring that any plan design that is recommended by the Insurance Committee shall be compliant with all applicable laws and shall not cost the District any money that has not been negotiated.
 - (H) Conducting a request in conjunction with the Purchasing Department to do a Request for Proposal (RFP) at least once every three years for all broker services that are related to Health and Welfare benefits, including major medical, dental, and vision, life insurance and voluntary products. The Purchasing Department's RFP shall be based entirely on the criteria set forth by the committee.
 - (I) Develop a set of criteria for each RFP. The Committee shall interview all responsible and responsive selected candidates and make a recommendation to the Superintendent and HTA Executive Board as to their choice of broker/JPA. The Superintendent will verify that the standard protocol for RFPs has been followed by the Purchasing Department. After verification that the process has been followed, the Superintendent will refer the agreement for broker services to the HUSD Governing Board for approval.

Appendix J

AGREEMENT FOR HOLDING ACCOUNT FOR HEMET TEACHERS ASSOCIATION HEALTH PLAN FUNDS

This Agreement for a Holding Account for HTA Health Plan Funds is entered into on May 28, 2013, by and between the Hemet Unified School District (The District) and the Hemet Teachers Association (HTA) regarding the use and maintenance of the District and employee contributions to the Hemet Unified School District Health Plan (the Plan). It is the intent of the parties that this account is operated by the District in trust for HTA.

Now therefore the PARTIES agree to form an HTA Holding Account in the District's General Fund (Fund 03) under a separate resource code to help maintain accountability, management and control of HTA's Health Plan funds. The District shall establish a separate resource code for HTA Active employees and a separate resource code for HTA Retirees who are covered by the District's Health Plan.

Whereas the District and HTA agreed on May 27, 2003 that the District would establish a separate account (Holding Account) for the management and control of HTA benefit plan activities, AND

Whereas the District and HTA also agreed the Holding Account shall be administered by the Insurance Committee which consists of three (3) HTA representatives appointed by the HTA President and two (2) District representatives appointed by the Superintendent.

The parties hereby agree as follows:

1. HTA Holding Account: The District shall establish and maintain a separate account (in General Fund, Fund 03) in which all District and employee contributions to the Plan, as described in section 4, below and including, but not limited to, all stop-loss recoveries relating to the Plan, rebates, interest income, overages, and gratuities shall be deposited. The payment of all Plan expenses as authorized under the Plan, including, but not limited to, any administrative expenses, operating expenses, insurance premiums and/or expenses relating to health and welfare claims made under the Plan, shall be made from the HTA Holding Account. The District agrees it shall not use any of the funds in the Fund 03 including any interest income or stop-loss recoveries, rebates, overages, and gratuities for any purpose other than to pay Plan expenses under the terms of the Plan. When the Plan is terminated, Fund 03 Holding Account shall be used by HTA for the benefit of certificated bargaining unit members.

2. **Definitions**:

(A) Fiscal Year: The fiscal year of the District is from July 1 through June 30.

- (B) <u>Benefit Plan Budget</u>: The Benefit Plan Budget is an annual budget to be prepared by the Plan Administrator in May of each year for the following Plan year commencing July 1, which shall include budgeted costs for covered health and welfare claims under the Plan and other Plan expenses.
- (C) <u>Insurance Committee:</u> The Health Benefit Insurance Committee shall consist of three (3) HTA representatives appointed by the HTA President and two (2) District representatives appointed by the District Superintendent.
- 3. <u>Term of Agreement</u>: This Agreement shall commence effective as of the date set forth above and shall continue in effect until terminated in accordance with the bargaining process as outlined under the Educational Employment Relations Act (EERA).
- 4. <u>Contributions to HTA Trust Holding Account Fund 03:</u> During the term of this Agreement, the contributions to the HTA Trust Account Fund 03 shall be as follows:
 - (A) <u>District Contributions</u>: Commencing on July 1, 2013, the District shall make equal contributions on a tenthly basis to the HTA Holding Account in an amount up to the negotiated annual District contribution for each full time unit member. The District shall also contribute a pro-rata amount for part-time salaried unit members who participate in the Plan, on the basis of the part-time unit member's percentage of full-time employment. For subsequent fiscal years, the amount of the District contribution may be amended to account for any changes made under the collective bargaining process.
 - (B) <u>Employee Contributions</u>: Commencing on July 1, 2013 each District unit member employee participating in the Plan shall make a contribution on a eleventhly basis. Part-time salaried unit members who participate in the Plan shall contribute the difference between the District's pro-rata contribution and what would be the combined District and participant contribution were the part-time unit member a full-time employee participating in the Plan. For subsequent fiscal years, the amount of each participating employee's contribution shall be determined through the collective bargaining process, after both the District and HTA review of the Benefit Plan Budget and take into account recommendations by the Insurance Committee.
- 5. <u>Health Benefit Insurance Committee Responsibilities:</u> The Insurance Committee shall meet at least quarterly and shall be responsible for: See Appendix I.
- 6. <u>District reporting of HTA Health and Welfare Holding Account Fund:</u>
 - (A) The balance of the HTA H&W Holding Account shall be reported separately in Interim Reports and the Unaudited Actuals Report under 'Other Assignments' area in the Fund Balance section of the SACS Form 01. A projected ending balance shall be reported in the same section of SACS Form 01 in

the Estimated Actuals Report along with the projected beginning balance in the annual Budget Report.

(B) The new funding lines that shall be used are: 03-771-0091 for all benefits for HTA Active members and the prescription plan for Retirees, Account 68-771-0099 will be used for all other Retiree Benefits.

On July 1, 2013 remaining funds in 'Fund 67' shall be transferred to Fund 03-771-0091 for HTA Active members and Retirees.

(C) Starting July 1, 2013:

Each month when payroll runs, a check payable to HUSD shall be generated for the employee's portion of the monthly health and welfare premiums. This check shall be deposited into Fund 03-771-0091.

Each month when insurance premium invoices are paid, the District contribution shall be automatically generated during the health and welfare billing process and shall be paid directly to the vendor. The employee's portion shall be added to the District's contribution to make the payment full.

Each month when payroll runs, the District shall deposit into Fund 03-771-0091 the negotiated monthly costs of the health and welfare benefit plan for all full-time unit members who waive (optout) of their benefits. The District shall also deposit into Fund 03-771-0091 the negotiated pro-rata monthly amounts for all part-time unit members who waive (opt-out) of their benefits.

Each month Retiree premiums shall be deposited into Fund 68-771-0099 as received to cover the Retiree's portion of the premium. Each month the District portion (OPEB) shall be deposited into Fund 68-771-0099 during the billing process to cover its portion of the premiums. Each month when insurance bills are processed for Retirees, the District portion and the Retiree portion shall be paid directly from Fund 68-771-0099 to the vendor. Any overage amounts shall be transferred into Fund 03-771-0091.

This is the current process as of January 28, 2014. This process is subject to change due to accounting, billing, state and/or federally mandated requirements. HTA will be notified of any changes within three (3) working days.

7. District Responsibilities: The District shall be responsible for:

(A) Preparing and submitting monthly (or tenthly) reports to the Insurance Committee which reflect the current employees who are covered under the Plan.

(B)	Providing the Insurance Committee with all information reasonably necessary for the Insurance

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING between HEMET UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT and HEMET TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

Speech and Language Therapist Tuition Reimbursement Program Effective November 1, 2016

The Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) and the Hemet Teachers Association (HTA) have a mutual interest in the recruitment and retention of Speech and Language Therapists who are new to the profession.

Therefore, HUSD and HTA enter into the following agreement to recruit and retain Speech and Language Therapists who are new to the profession by providing a tuition reimbursement incentive:

1.0 Eligibility

- 1.1 Speech and Language Therapists who are initially placed on Column A, Step I or Column B, Step I of the HUSD Speech and Language Therapist salary schedule shall be eligible for the incentive.
- 1.2 Speech and Language Therapists shall remain in paid status, as of the last day of their contracted work year, to be eligible for the incentive.

2.0 Incentive Payment

- 2.1 Total incentive shall not exceed \$18,000 and shall be distributed in equal annual payments over a six (6) year period.
- 2.2 Annual distribution payments shall be in the amount of \$3,000.
- 2.3 Distribution of payment shall be paid annually in the last pay warrant of the contracted work year.

This Agreement shall constitute the entire agreement of the parties and may only be modified or amended in writing, signed by both parties. This agreement shall be effective as of November 1, 2016 and is subject to ratification by the HTA and HUSD Board of Education. This MOU will be reviewed no later than April 1, on an annual basis, by HTA and HUSD to review the effectiveness of the tuition reimbursement incentive.

Memorandum of Understanding Between HEMET UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT and HEMET TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

School Nurses Effective July 1, 2019

The Hemet Unified School District (District) and the Hemet Teachers Association (HTA) agree to the following concerning School Nurses (referred to herein as "Nurse" or "Nurses"):

- 1. This MOU shall supersede and replace the Nurse MOU entered into on April 24, 2018, and shall be effective July 1, 2019.
- 2. All school nurses shall work eight (8) hour day (inclusive of a 30 minute duty-free lunch), 187 day work year. Additionally, Nurses shall be paid in accordance with the attached Nurses' Salary Schedule. Work performed outside of the contract year or workday must be pre-approved by management and shall be paid at the negotiated R&D rate.
- 3. Incumbent Nurses shall be placed on the Nurses' Salary Schedule at the same step and column upon which they would have been placed on the Certificated Teacher Salary Schedule.
- 4. Nurses shall not be required to provide "clinic service." Clinic service is defined as: Immunization services for students and staff TB/Hepatitis B services.
- 5. Nurses shall not be required to provide services for non-public schools.
- 6. Nurses shall not be required to substitute or relieve a classified Health Services Technician (unless there is a medical necessity), though it is recognized that Nurse and Health Services Technician duties will occasionally overlap.
- 7. Summer assignments shall be voluntary; Nurses may apply for consideration.
- 8. This MOU and its attachment shall expire June 30, 2020, after which time it will be incorporated into the existing collective bargaining agreement in a manner to be determined by the parties.

MOU - Extended Day Kindergarten

Extended Day Kindergarten Program Strategic Rollout MOU

The Hemet Unified School District (District) and the Hemet Teachers Association (HTA) desire to maximize the development of the whole child. Whole child development includes not only academic instruction, but also social/emotional development, citizenship/character building, and ensuring overall well-being and physical health.

To that end, the parties agree to extend the school day for kindergarten classes in accordance with this MOU, with the understanding that the additional time will be devoted to whole child development.

Accordingly, the Parties agree as follows:

- The terms of Extended Day Kindergarten Program (EDK) will be in this MOU for the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 school years. Commencing in the 2020-2021 school year, full implementation of EDK at all sites shall be incorporated into the collective bargaining agreement.
- 2. In the 2018-19 school year, there will be no more than six (6) schools participating in the EDK rollout. Participation in EDK rollout will be based upon a vote of the staff at a particular site, with a 75% affirmative vote of the unit members at the site qualifying the site to participate in the EDK. Sites that have proposed an extended day kindergarten MOU shall be eligible for the first four spots. The remaining spots will be filled by sites that voted to participate, with the highest percentage of approval receiving the remaining spots. If two or more sites have the same percentage approval, their rank shall be determined by lot conducted by the HTA President and the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources (or their designees).
- 3. In the 2019-2020 school year, the sites who participated in the EDK rollout in the 2018-2019 school year will continue in the program. Additionally, any new sites with a 75% affirmative vote of the unit members at the site shall participate in the EDK. Commencing in the 2020-2021 school year, EDK shall be fully implemented within the District.
- 4. The District and HTA shall form an Advisory Team on extended day kindergarten programs.
 - a. The Advisory Team shall be comprised of six (6) unit members selected by HTA and six (6) District representatives selected by the District.
 - b. Two (2) Co-Chairs shall be selected: one (1) appointed by the District and one (1) appointed by HTA. The two (2) Co-Chairs shall jointly schedule the first meeting (date, time and location) and create the agenda. The first meeting shall be held no later than September 1, 2018.

- c. The Advisory Team shall set its own meeting schedule, meeting agendas and procedural rules.
- d. The Advisory Team shall make recommendations to the Bargaining Teams on any issues considered negotiable under the law/Collective Bargaining Agreement on how to design and implement the EDK. Suggestions that do not involve negotiations may be made directly to the District.
- e. A quorum shall be defined as at least three (3) HTA representatives and three (3) district representatives present for voting purposes.
- f. Any recommendations to the District or Bargaining Teams shall be agreed to by at least 80% of the Advisory Team participants in attendance.
- g. The Advisory Team shall analyze data (e.g. attendance, class size, discipline, student groups, ESGI and MAP tests) to ensure that the program provides a well-rounded curriculum that addresses whole child development.
- h. The Advisory Team shall continue through the 2018-19 and 2019-20 school years to monitor and recommend refinements to the program.
- 5. The EDK teacher work day shall be comprised of three (3) categories of time:
 - a. Instructional/Recess Time: 306 minutes.
 - b. Daily Prep Time: 55 minutes.
 - c. Before/After School: 40 minutes.

Adjustments will be made to address the collaboration schedule (currently held on Wednesdays) to meet the criteria of Appendix A of the Collaboration Time MOU-Amendment One (1) (p. 145).

- 6. Unless expressly included herein, there shall be no K-1 combination classes. The parties recognize that K-1 combination classes may be necessary at outlying schools, alternative education sites, and special education programs. If a K-1 combination is needed in one of these sites/programs, the District shall provide notice to HTA as soon as is practicable, but no later than 24 hours after the combination class is created.
- 7. EDK teachers shall be provided one and a half (1 ½) hour per day of instructional aide support. When there is no aide available, the District shall make all reasonable attempts to secure a substitute. If an aide is absent for five (5) consecutive days, or expected to be absent for five (5) consecutive days, and a substitute is not available, the District shall provide assistance to the EDK teacher (such as a non-substitute District employee). This also applies when a position is expected to be vacant for five (5) or more consecutive days.

In providing assistance, the District shall not remove a non-substitute aide from an existing assignment.

- 8. EDK teachers shall be provided four (4) days of release time for testing.
- EDK teachers shall not provide lunch supervision. The scheduling of EDK teachers supervision duties shall be consistent with other primary level teachers at their school site.

This Agreement shall constitute the entire agreement of the parties and may only be modified or amended in writing, signed by both parties. This agreement shall be reviewed by no later than March 1, 2019 to review the effectiveness of the EDK.

This agreement is subject to approval by the HUSD Governing Board and HTA membership.

MOU-COLLABORATION TIME

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING between HEMET UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT and HEMET TEACHERS ASSOCIATION Collaboration Time

The Hemet Unified School District (District) and the Hemet Teachers Association (HTA) have a mutual interest in fostering collaboration between bargaining unit members. Therefore, HUSD and HTA enter into the following MOU concerning collaboration time, effective July 1, 2019:

1. Purpose and Definition

1.1 The purpose of collaboration time is to ensure that all students learn at high levels. Collaboration is defined as school staff (certificated and administration) working together to take collective responsibility for the success of each student. Collaboration is effectively implemented when school staff works together interdependently to impact classroom practices in ways that improve outcomes for their students, their team, and their school. Collaboration meetings shall be aligned to district and site goals.

2. Schedule and Workday

- 2.1. There shall be one (1) day per week designated as late start/early release. On such days, there will be an eighty (80) minute meeting.
- 2.2. The late start/early release shall be on the same day of the week, which is currently Wednesday. A change in the day of the week shall be determined on or before the Thanksgiving Break for the following academic year.
- 2.3. Before each September 1, Administration shall develop and provide to HTA an annual meeting schedule which may be changed upon reasonable notice. Absent extenuating circumstances, reasonable notice shall be considered eight (8) calendar days prior to the meeting.
- 2.4 Collaboration shall be incorporated within the certificated work day.
- 2.5. The District shall make a reasonable effort to minimize scheduling elementary teacher trainings on early start/late release Wednesdays.
- 2.6. In accordance with the chart attached as Exhibit A, the certificated work day shall consist of 401 minutes plus a duty free lunch of not less than 30 minutes. In order to facilitate the late start and early release days, the following changes to the certificated work day shall be implemented:
- 2.6.1 The 180 minutes previously allocated for monthly before/after school meeting time (in article 7.4 and 7.4.1) shall be incorporated within the work day as described in Section 2.6.2.
- 2.6.2 Ten (10 minutes shall be added to each work day (for a total of 401 minutes per day). Thirty (30) minutes shall be reallocated from weekly instructional minutes to collaboration time.
- 2.6.3 During the term of this MOU, the chart in 7.1.6.2 and language in subsection 7.12.2.2 and 7.12.2.3 of the Certificated Collective Bargaining Agreement will be amended to reflect the change in instructional and total minutes. The remainder of the chart shall remain the same.

3. Meeting Type and Purpose

- 3.1. Administrators shall monitor and supervise all work at their site. Administrators shall provide district and site goals and the support necessary to achieve intended collaboration outcomes.
- 3.2. The meetings will be designated and scheduled as follows:

- 3.3. <u>Site Leadership Designed Collaboration</u>: Site Leadership shall set the agenda and meeting location. The agenda shall reflect the district and school goals and include the following components: (1) the intended outcomes of the meeting; (2) required steps to accomplish the intended outcomes; (3) how the intended outcomes of the meeting relate to student achievement. Administration shall solicit input from staff prior to creating meeting topics for each semester. The site leadership created topics shall be guided by input received.
- 3.4. <u>Teacher Collaboration</u>: Teachers shall set the agenda and an on-campus meeting location (unless an off-campus District site is pre-approved by the Principal) for Teacher Collaboration time. This agenda will reflect the school goals and include the following components: (1) the intended outcomes of the meeting; (2) required steps to accomplish the intended outcomes; (3) how the intended outcomes of the meeting relate to student achievement; (4) administrative support needed to accomplish the intended outcomes; and (5) submission of the agenda for the next meeting for administrative input. After a teacher collaboration session, the team shall provide minutes to the administration based on the agreed upon components.
- 3.5 HUSD and HTA will jointly create an agenda/minutes template to be used for teacher collaboration meetings. This shall be reviewed on an annual basis.

4. Alternative Schedule

Chief Negotiator, HTA

4.1 In certain instances over the course of the school year, collaboration/staff meetings may not occur (i.e. calendared minimum days, vacation days, elementary conferences, teacher planning day(s); the last day of school), and these dates shall not be considered in calculating the annual percentages described above. Refer to the Board approved calendar for reference.

This agreement shall constitute the entire agreement of the parties and may only be modified or amended in writing and signed by both parties. This agreement is subject to approval by HTA and HUSD Board of Education. This MOU shall run through June 30, 2021. No later than March 15, 2021 the parties shall meet to review the effectiveness of the MOU and its fiscal impact with the intent of agreeing upon language to be inserted into Collective Bargaining Agreement.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

between

HEMET UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT and HEMET TEACHERS ASSOCIATION
Special Education

Supports for Special Education Programs and Practices Effective July 1, 2019

The Hemet Unified School District (District) and the Hemet Teachers Association (HTA) have a mutual interest in providing best practices when educating Students with Disabilities (SWD) and providing a Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) in the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) within the Hemet Unified School District.

Therefore, HUSD and HTA enter into the following agreement for special education programs:

1. Joint Special Education Committee

- 1.1 Both parties agree to a Joint Special Education Committee (JSEC) to address and make a good faith effort to resolve District-wide special education issues that are non-bargainable. This committee shall be comprised of eight (8) individuals, four (4) of which shall be appointed by the District and four (4) shall be appointed by HTA.
- 1.2 The District shall appoint a co-chair and HTA shall appoint a co-chair. Meeting chair responsibilities shall rotate between the District and HTA. Meeting agendas shall be created jointly between the co-chairs.
 - 1.3 Issues raised in the JSEC meeting shall be supported by relevant data, if applicable.
 - 1.4 The JSEC shall meet at least four (4) times throughout the school year. The first meeting shall occur no later than the fourth week of August. At the final committee meeting of the school year, the Committee shall schedule the first meeting of the following school year.
 - 1.5 Individual special education concerns may be raised in the periodic meetings between the Special Education Department and the HTA President.

2. Instructional Aides

2.1 Instructional Aides shall be assigned as needed or designated by the Individual Education Program (IEP). Special Education Teachers shall be consulted as to the scheduling of such aides, but the District shall make the final assignment.

3. Scheduling of IEP Meetings

- 3.1 The District shall make every effort to schedule IEP team meetings within the Unit Member's regular duty day, and outside of their preparation period.
- 3.2 If the IEP team meeting goes beyond regular contractual hours. Unit Members shall be compensated at the R&D rate (Appendix C) upon the submission of a Hemet Unified time card.

4. Inclusive Practices

- 4.1 All Special Education classrooms shall have all core instructional materials as afforded by the Williams Act.
- 4.2 All Special Education Teachers shall be provided applicable core curriculum trainings.
- 4.3 Additionally, site administration shall take into consideration all instructional programs on campus when planning for ancillary materials and equipment.

- 4.4 Mainstreaming describes a model in which a student with an IEP is placed in a general education environment that is not co-taught by a special education teacher.
- 4.5 Co-teaching is defined as a situation in which a general education teacher and a special education teacher regularly instruct, support and assess in a general education setting, students with and without IEPs.
- 4.5.1 Participating teachers must hold at least a preliminary credential (or equivalent).
- 4.5.2 Participation in a co-teaching model shall be on a voluntary basis year to year.
- 4.5.3 At least one of the co-teachers must hold a clear credential (or equivalent).
- 4.5.4 Unit members participating in the co-teaching model shall receive separate and distinct evaluations as outlined in Article 15.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA).
- 4.5.5 The number of students with IEPs (not including those who have a speech only IEP) in the co-teaching class shall not exceed twelve (12).
- 4.5.6 Every effort shall be made to provide common planning time for the co-teaching partners.
- 4.5.7 Both unit members assigned to co-teaching classes shall participate in instruction within the classroom on a daily basis. Substitute teachers for either unit member shall be provided due to an absence. If a substitute is not available, the District should follow its substitute protocol.

5. Extended School Year (ESY)

- 5.1 ESY is a service listed on a student's IEP.
- 5.2 ESY is a voluntary assignment for Unit Members.
- 5.3 ESY assignments shall be compensated at the summer school rate in Appendix C in the CBA.

6. Special Education Teacher Site Collaboration Time

6.1 Unit Members who teach special education require additional support and collaboration time to address the individual needs of the students and maintain compliance with legal requirements. Collaboration regarding this topic is encouraged between site administration and Unit Members.

7. Case Management

- 7.1 Stipend. Special Education classroom teachers who are providing core instruction and also manage a caseload shall receive an annual stipend of \$750.
- 7.2 Teachers referenced in 7.1 may engage in conversation with site administration regarding the possibility of release time for the purposes of case management.

This agreement shall constitute the entire agreement of the parties and may only be modified or amended in writing and signed by both parties. This agreement shall be implemented beginning in the 2019-2020 school year and is subject to approval by HTA and HUSD Board of Education. This MOU shall run through June 30, 2021. No later than March 15, 2021 the parties shall meet to review the effectiveness of the MOU and its fiscal impact with the intent of agreeing upon language to be inserted into Collective Bargaining Agreement.

Memorandum of Understanding

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is entered into by and between the Hemet Unified School District (hereinafter "District") and the Hemet Teachers Association/CTA/NEA (hereinafter "Association").

WHEREAS, the District and the Association are parties to a collective bargaining agreement ("CBA") that expired on June 30, 2019; and

WHEREAS, Articles 14.1, 14.1.1 and 14.2 of the CBA include provisions agreed upon by the parties to comply with California's class size grade span adjustment program. Specifically, they provide a collectively bargaining alternative class size average at grades TK-3 for each site in the District and regulations for its calculation; and

WHEREAS, the District and the Association mutually desire to agree and clarify by written memorandum of understanding that the alternative staffing ratio provided in Articles 14.1, 14.1.1 and 14.2 shall remain in effect for the 2019-2020 school year, notwithstanding the CBA's expiration on June 30, 2019.

NOW, THEREFORE IT IS AGREED BY AND BETWEEN THE PARTIES AS FOLLOWS:

- Articles 14.1 and 14.2 of the CBA shall remain in effect for the 2019-20 school year, unless otherwise negotiated.
- This MOU shall remain in effect only until the ratification of a successor agreement to the CBA, at which time it shall automatically expire.
- This MOU is unique unto its own circumstances and shall not be cited as precedentsetting by either party in the future for any purpose other than to implement the terms of the MOU itself.

Effective July 1, 2019 - June 30, 2020

The Hemet Unified School District (HUSD or Administration) and the Hemet Teachers Association (HTA) have a mutual interest in amending the chart found in section 7.1.6.2 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement due to Community Day School minimum educational day requirements outlined in the California Education Code.

Effective in the 2019-2020 school year, the educational teacher work day outlined in 7.1.6.2 of the CBA shall be amended as follows for Certificated Employees assigned to ASPIRE Community Day School due to educational minimum requirements for Community Day Schools outlined in the California Education Code:

1.1- All Grades at ASPIRE will adhere to the schedule below.

Administration shall solicit input from staff prior to creating meeting topics for each semester.

This amendment shall be revisited by both parties before March 1, 2020. This agreement shall expire on June 30, 2020, unless there is mutual agreement to extend.
